Background

The Asian Creative and Digital Youth Summit (ACE-YS) is a pioneering initiative that serves as a hub for collective youth action, with the primary objective of mapping and connecting Asian players in navigating global opportunities within the creative and digital economy. The ACE-YS is not just a one-time event, but a forum that will be held annually, with a decade-long plan to evolve into a highly respected international organization in the region and beyond. This platform aims to host over 6,000 young creatives to develop skills, share ideas and gain access to potential investors through a series of activities.

The Southeast Asia (SEA) region, home to several unicorn and decacorn startups, is a young economy with a significant demographic dividend that is yet to be fully tapped. Many young people in the region are required to broaden and sharpen their skills, knowledge, and networks to fully participate in and contribute to the creative economy. They also face challenges in gaining international recognition for their work and talents, as well as connecting with international investors.

The lack of effective inventor-investor matchmaking has become a barrier for young creatives to realize their potentials in the creative economy. Furthermore, the creative sector in the region is often characterized by informality, which can limit access to resources and opportunities.

The ACE-YS 2023, the inaugural event of this annual series which focuses on SEA, aims to address these challenges by providing a platform for young people across the SEA region to develop skills, share ideas, and express their creativity. The summit will also foster innovation and entrepreneurship in the creative industries, promote cross-border collaboration and knowledge sharing, and provide opportunities for young creatives to connect with international investors.

Our vision is to leverage Asia's young economy and demographic dividend to drive a vibrant, sustainable creative and digital economy. Through the annual ACE-YS events, we aim to map and connect creators, creative entrepreneurs, policymakers, communities from ASEAN+3 countries who have the drive and influence to advance the Asian creative and digital industry in our Creative Catalysts Program.

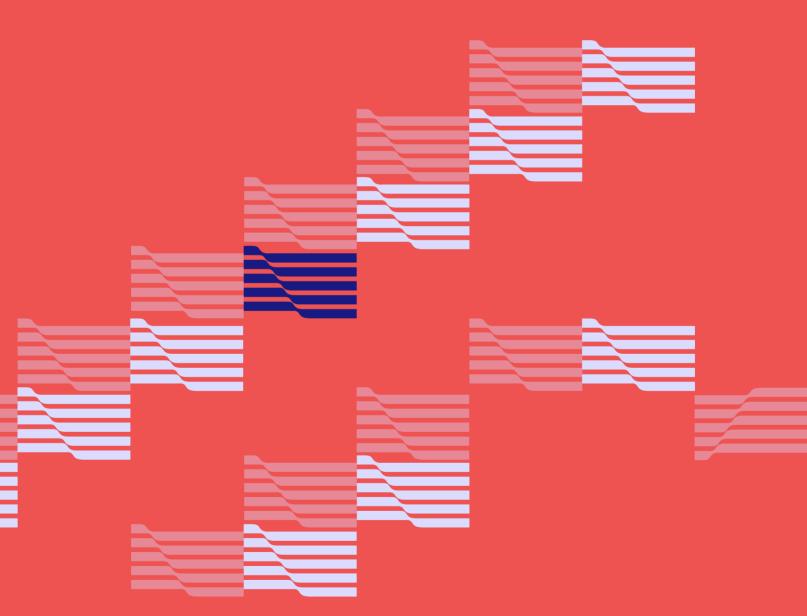

* OPENING REMARKS

James' stirring call for collective dreaming and his vision of a future where the youth thrives laid the groundwork for the event, reflecting Lazada's mission to drive progress in South Asia forward through technology and commerce.

Complementing James' fervor, Minister Thohir lent an air of gravitas to the proceedings, underscoring the paramount importance of united action in advancing the creative and digital economy across the vast Asian region. His vision for ACE-YS 2023 as "The New Wave from Southeast Asia" radiated optimism, offering young creatives a platform to hone their skills, exchange ideas, and engage with global investors. Erick's unwavering belief in a future where Asia emerges as the global leader in the creative and digital economy added a layer of inspiration.

Together, James' passion and Erick's authority formed a harmonious blend, ushering in a future where the dreams and talents of the youth are the driving force behind a brighter and more innovative Asia.





From Inspiration to AI-Spiration: Redefining Creativity with Artificial Intelligence

Amar Subramanya (VP of Engineering, Google Bard)

Amar Subramanya delivered a presentation on the transformative potential of artificial intelligence (AI) in the creative economy. He introduced BARD, a generative Al product designed to enhance creative endeavors. Amar expanded on the evolution of Al technology, emphasizing its applications in language processing. During his talk, he highlighted the benefits of using BARD and emphasized the importance of responsible Al development, including addressing biases and ensuring accuracy. Amar encouraged the audience to view Al as a tool for imagination and creativity, concluding with an invitation to explore BARD, a conversational AI tool, to stimulate curiosity and experience the possibilities of Al.

Key takeaways from the presentation highlighted Google's commitment to supporting Indonesia's digital and creative economy. Programs like Gapura Digital and Women Will have trained over 2 million small and medium businesses in Indonesia since 2015. Additionally, the YouTube Creative Ecosystem contributed 7.4 trillion rupiah to Indonesia's GDP in 2022.

Google for Startups provides mentorship, training, and funding to support Indonesian startups. The overarching theme is Google's dedication to deploying AI solutions that benefit the creative community and nurture digital talents. The adoption of AI is considered instrumental in building a robust digital economy that contributes to productive growth.

Google BARD was highlighted as a platform for users to collaborate directly with Google's advanced models. Its capabilities include generating stories, ideating on trends, providing coding assistance, and analyzing photos for various tasks such as expense management and resume creation.

Google's commitment to social benefit and addressing biases in AI models was reiterated. The potential of AI to positively impact diverse fields, from sciences and arts to healthcare and education, is underscored. Users were encouraged to explore BARD, emphasizing the exciting possibilities that AI offers in various creative and practical applications.





Intellectual Property Rights: Balancing Access and Protection in the Asian Digital Economy Scene

Dr. Allen Au-Yeung (Ex-VP Head of Creative, Walt Disney Company Asia)

Allen Au-Yeung, a distinguished former employee of the Walt Disney Company Asia, graciously shared his wealth of experience and insights with participants, emphasizing the pivotal role of creativity and storytelling in building successful brands. Throughout his speech, Allen highlighted the importance of collaboration and teamwork in the creative process, encouraging participants the open exchange of ideas. He also stressed the value of focusing on quality and adopting a long-term perspective when cultivating creativity.

Key points from Allen's speech include his assertion that "quality is the best business model", highlighting the critical importance of delivering excellence in all endeavors. He also emphasized the crucial role of brand strategy in fostering growth, recognizing it as a cornerstone of success. Allen urged participants not to shy away from failure and to embrace risks, emphasizing that creativity involves both storytelling and the art of surprising audiences.

Curiosity emerged as a recurring theme, with Allen affirming its pivotal role as the key to unlocking creativity. Drawing on his extensive experience, he shared examples and videos to illustrate these points, demonstrating the power of curiosity,

adaptability, and active listening in the creative process. Allen elucidated the multifaceted nature of building a brand, emphasizing the synthesis of story, skill, and style.

Furthermore, the speaker advocated for a holistic approach, acknowledging the significance of relationships in creative work. He encouraged flexibility, an open-minded approach, and the importance of staying attuned to others while being generous with ideas. Allen poetically described creativity as a form of magic that adds meaning and beauty to life, comparing it to riding a motorcycle on an open highway, signifying the exhilarating freedom inherent in the creative journey.

As the speech concluded, Allen left the audience with an inspiring directives: to play, have fun, make time for creativity, and tirelessly pursue possibilities. Finally, he encapsulated the essence of creativity, likening it to hard work, underscoring that the magic of creativity is not separate from diligence but an inseparable part of it. Allen's insightful discourse serves as a beacon for individuals navigating the landscape of creativity and brand-building. It offers a roadmap for those seeking to infuse their work with meaning, beauty, and lasting impact.





Empowering Tomorrow: Unleashing Indonesia's Economic Potential through Digital Transformation

Dr. Rizal Edwin Manansang, Ak., M.Sc. (Expert Staff for Digital Transformation, Creativity, and Human Resources, Coordinating Ministry for Economic Affairs of Indonesia)

Rizal Edwin Manansang highlighted Indonesia's commitment to unlocking its economic potential through digital transformation. He acknowledged that the COVID-19 pandemic had accelerated the global adoption of digital technology, driving significant shifts in business processes and consumer behavior. The projection for the value of ASEAN's digital economy is set at USD 1 trillion by 2030, with Indonesia contributing a substantial 40% to this sum.

The anticipated growth of Indonesia's digital economy is staggering, with a predicted value of USD 130 billion in 2025, potentially soaring to a range between USD 222 billion and USD 360 billion by 2030. However, Rizal outlined key challenges hindering Indonesia's digital transformation, including the absence of a unified vision and strategy, digital talent shortages, limitations in connectivity infrastructure, regulatory gaps, and issues related to funding and investment.

To overcome these challenges, the Indonesian government is actively pursuing a multi-faceted approach. This includes the development of a national strategy for the

digital economy, the implementation of initiatives to enhance digital talent development, improvements in connectivity infrastructure, support for micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs), and setting ambitious digital transformation targets through 2045.

The outlined targets include positioning Indonesia among the top 20 in digital competitiveness rankings, increasing the digital economy's contribution to GDP, elevating the percentage of information, communication, and technology (ICT) professionals in the workforce, and aspiring to have 61 unicorn startups by 2045.

Additionally, Indonesia aims to accelerate the initiation of the Digital Economy Framework Agreement (DEFA) negotiation within ASEAN, with the ultimate goal of achieving the region's ambitious USD 2 trillion digital economy value target by 2030. The government's comprehensive strategy reflects a determined effort to navigate and capitalize on the opportunities presented by the digital age, paving the way for sustained economic growth and competitiveness on both national and regional levels.





Collaboration & Innovation: The Future of Asian Digital Economy

Sandiaga Uno (Minister of Tourism and Creative Economy of Indonesia)

The ASEAN Creativity and Digital Economy Youth Summit 2023 convened in Jakarta with a bold vision: to position Indonesia as the focal point of the digital economy and creative industries. With a youthful population of approximately 90 million, Indonesia holds immense potential for digital economic growth. Projections indicate that Asia's digital economy will soar to USD 130 billion by 2025, driven by flourishing sectors such as e-commerce, gaming, music, films, and animations. Notably, Indonesia's e-commerce Gross Merchandise Value (GMV) is anticipated to surge from USD 59 billion in 2022 to a staggering USD 95 billion in 2025.

However, a critical shortfall in digital talent poses a significant challenge. While the country requires 600,000 skilled individuals annually, the educational system currently produces only 400,000. Bridging this gap calls for collaborative efforts, increased investments in education, and the provision of mentorship and opportunities to support Indonesia's emergence as a digital powerhouse in the region. The Indonesian Ministry of Tourism and Creative Economy underscores its unwavering commitment to catalyzing collaborations and fostering innovation within Indonesia's digital economy landscape.

The summit's overarching ambition extends beyond economic growth, aiming to redefine Asia's narrative as a beacon of sustainability and quality development. Central to this vision are the core tenets of innovation, adaptation, and collaboration, echoed throughout the summit's proceedings. The Minister emphasizes the imperative of active participation and partnership in this collective endeavor, advocating for a holistic approach that encompasses addressing the digital talent gap and cultivating a knowledge-driven educational ecosystem.

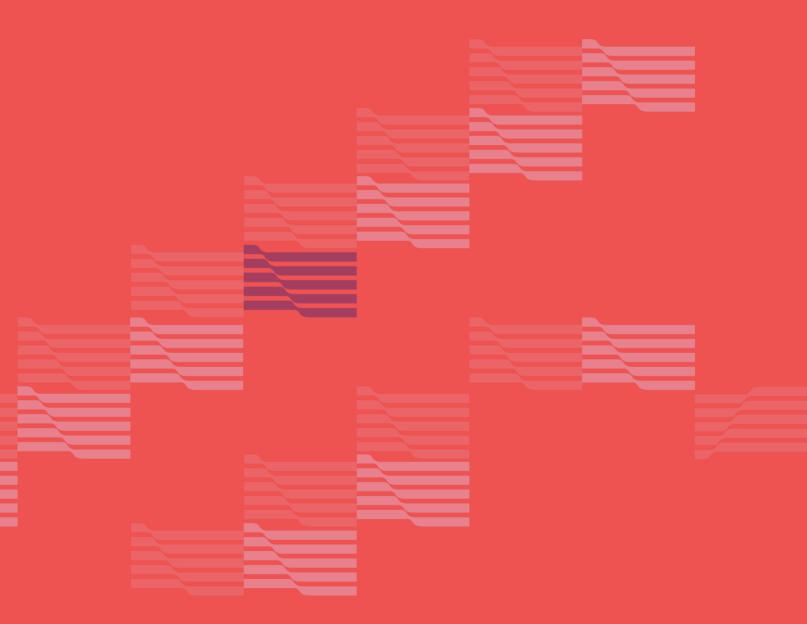

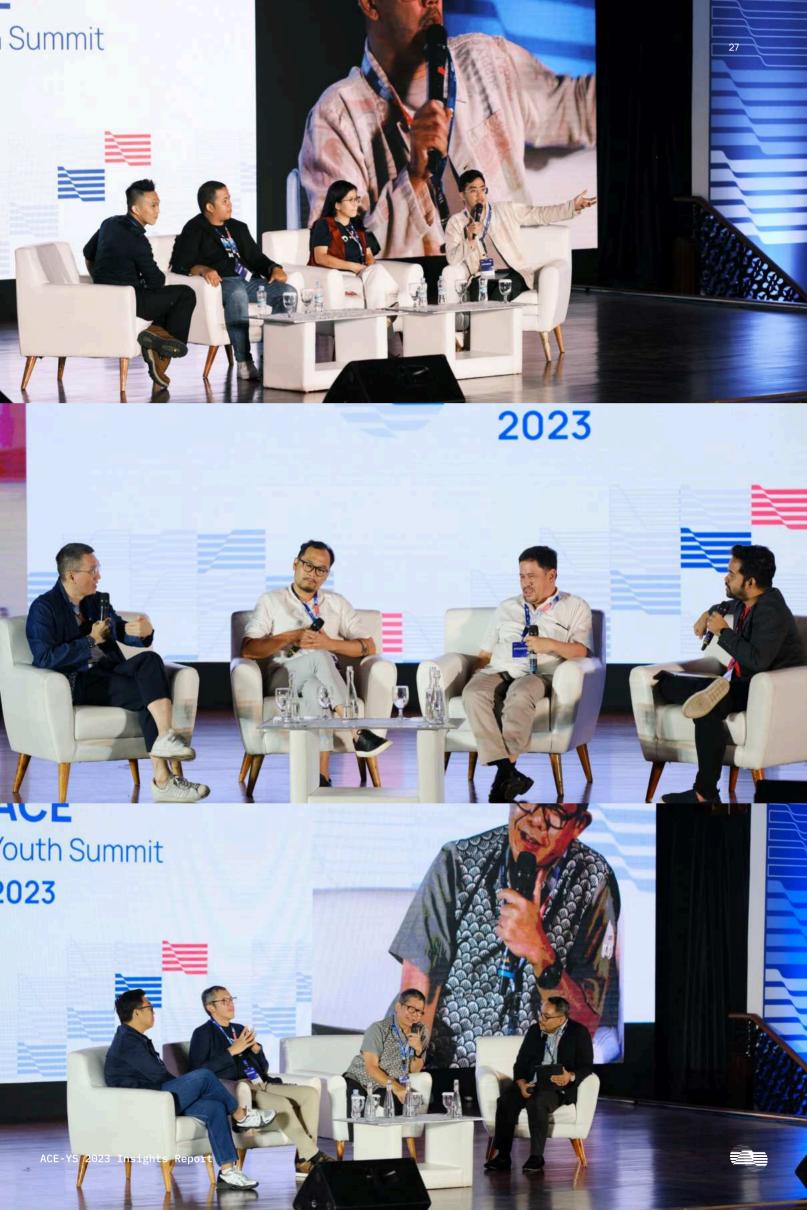

Content Innovation and Monetization Strategies in the Digital Age





Exploring the transformative journey from traditional media to dynamic live streaming, the landscape of content has evolved from catering to a broad audience to leveraging niche advantages. This shift has democratized content access across every corner of Indonesia, enabling the sharing of content that was once considered impossible, such as live streaming treks for product promotion. This evolution has not only facilitated innovative content creation but has also created substantial opportunities for monetization.

The emergence of the creator economy and the incorporation of diverse content categories, including food, travel, and entertainment, underscore IDN Media's commitment to engaging a diverse audience. Concurrently, television broadcasting has adapted to curate content to compete with international offerings, such as the broadcast of Korean dramas. The specificity of niches has necessitated the development of skills in algorithms and search engine optimization (SEO), becoming imperative for journalists to navigate the digital realm successfully.

- Winston Utomo, representing IDN Media, Indonesia's leading consumer tech platform. He shared the founding story, emphasizing the crucial mission of addressing the information gap in Indonesia, with a particular focus on regions outside Jakarta. The core principle of democratizing information led to the establishment of IDN Media in 2014.
- Amanda Valani, from Viva Digital
 Networks, traced her career trajectory
 from a broadcast journalist to her
 current role in business development at
 the online media holding company. She
 highlighted the profound impact of the
 digital revolution on the media industry,
 stressing the imperative for journalists
 to pivot and adapt to digital platforms.
- Ogie Baringbing provided valuable insights into Lazada's strategy, combining real-time, interactive shopping experiences with creative content. This not only enhances customer engagement but also broadens monetization opportunities for sellers, exemplified by successful initiatives like LazLive, LazBeauty Besties, and Dapur Lazada.

- Evolution of Television Broadcasting:
 Traditional television broadcasting has
 evolved to curate content that competes
 with international offerings, such as
 broadcasting Korean dramas. This
 adaptation underscores the dynamic
 nature of the media industry and the
 need to stay relevant in a globalized
 content landscape.

The session delved deep into the strategic maneuvers our speakers employed to adapt to the ever-changing digital content and monetization landscape. Beyond shedding light on innovative content approaches, it underscored a crucial paradigm shift – monetization is no longer a mere sidekick but an integral and creative force shaping the very essence of compelling content. The speakers illuminated the intricate dance between creativity and revenue generation, affirming that in this era, mastering both is essential for success in the digital content arena.





CREATIVE TALKS 02

Tunes, Tech, and Triumph: Mastering Digital Music Success





Four distinct personalities, each with their unique dedication, have contributed to the unprecedented dynamism in the success of digital music over the last few decades. Extensive research conducted by Ipsos and Oxford Economics revealed a burgeoning audience and evolving tastes, culminating in

a collaborative effort by our speaker Afgansyah Reza (Afgan) with international artists Jackson Wang and Robin Thicke. This collaboration became possible as music transformed from a personal form of entertainment to a global phenomenon, breaking production constraints and elevating artists' creativity, as exemplified by Afgan and fellow Indonesian artist Tami Aulia. Tami herself embraced the viral phenomenon by showcasing her busking talents on the streets of Milan. This prompts contemplation on the evolving nature of music promotion, suggesting that elaborate grand plans are no longer necessary. Instead, the power of authenticity and impromptu moments takes center stage.

The driving forces behind this industry shift in Indonesia were none other than YouTube and the Ministry of Tourism and Creative Industry. YouTube, functioning as both a space and a trampoline, facilitates artists in overcoming boundaries. The platform demonstrated its commitment to nurturing the music community through features like analytics and programs such as YouTube Music Night. Globally, YouTube invested a substantial USD 6 billion in 2022, allocating 30% of payouts to user-generated content, showcasing its financial support for creators. This supportive environment is further bolstered by the Ministry's efforts to align the goals of the music industry, whether it aims to dominate domestically, regionally, or internationally. The importance of establishing frameworks for rewards, copyrights, and industry connections was emphasized to ensure the industry's sustainable growth.

- Afgansyah Reza emphasized the significant shift in music promotion, highlighting the move from traditional channels to digital platforms. He stressed the transformative role of platforms like YouTube in enabling artists to reach a global audience, liberating them from the constraints of conventional media.
- Tami Aulia, t reflecting on her roots in Lombok, discussed the challenges of limited promotion opportunities in traditional settings. Her digital transition in Yogyakarta marked a pivotal moment, using platforms to connect with audiences through covers and original content.
- Olavina Harahap, Senior Product
 Marketing Manager at YouTube, provided
 valuable insights into the platform's
 impact on the music industry. She
 underscored YouTube's crucial role in
 reaching new audiences and supporting
 breakthrough artists.
- Odo Manuhutu, Deputy Coordinating Minister for Tourism and Creative Economy, discussed the government's pivotal role in fostering a thriving music industry. Drawing parallels with the gaming industry, Odo highlighted the need for collective ambition and collaboration to create a healthy and flourishing environment.

Moreover, a deeper exploration reveals gaming's potential to drive social and cultural change. Community-centric marketing strategies, expansion into mobile gaming, and a commitment to fairness in game development demonstrate a broader dedication to inclusivity and cultural preservation. The symbiotic relationship between gaming and youth lifestyle, influencing aspirations and career choices, further highlights the industry's role in shaping experiences and narratives that extend beyond mere entertainment, fostering cultural integration and offering transformative experiences. Indonesian value of "Gotong Royong" incorporated into the games not only as a form of entertainment but as a conduit for crafting memorable narratives, cultural integration, and transformative experiences.

With equity-based investment and short-term loans, Bizhare is a transparent and appealing option for creative businesses seeking growth.
- Arifin Putra, an angel investor and founding partner at Habibi Innovation Incubator, provides a peek into the world of angel investors. Clear financial transparency, legal entity status, and profitability are key for securing their investment. Building trust through strong bookkeeping and tax compliance is essential.

In terms of local aspiring creators comparing themselves to industry giants like Pixar, Ronny Gani gave a number of personal advices. These suggestions included leveraging resources, avoiding overthinking, and maximizing creativity within cost constraints.

 ACE-YS, emphasizing the need for a

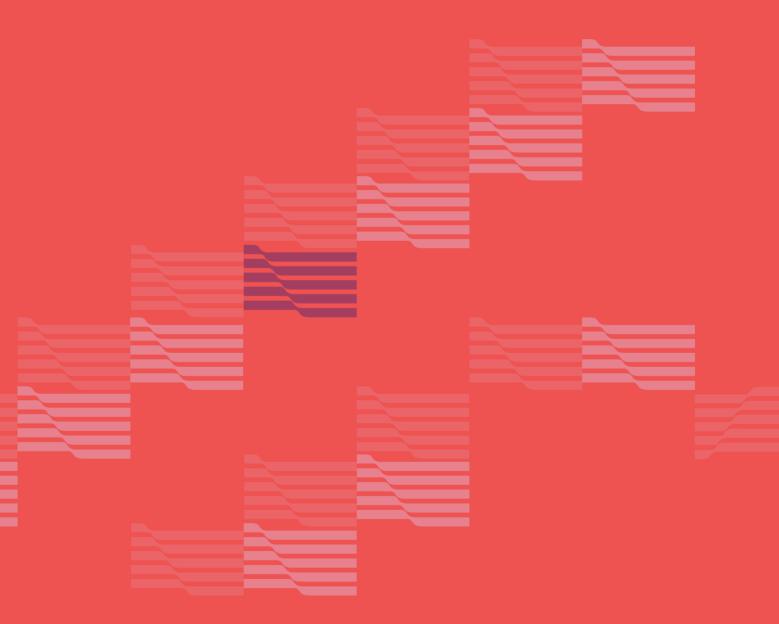

The cultural and creative industries have witnessed significant growth in recent years, driven in part by the rise of the gig economy. However, many of these workers operate in the informal sector, often facing unique challenges that impact their livelihoods and well-being. This theme aligns with Asia's goals of economic integration, cultural preservation, and youth empowerment.

In the insightful discussions of the first roundtable, participants delved into the transformative landscape, casting reflections back to the pivotal year of 1987, marked by the absence of automated teller machines (ATM) and economic challenges faced by a significant portion of Indonesia's population. The consensus emphasized the critical importance of comprehending historical shifts as a foundation for anticipating the future.

The impact of the digital era on work dynamics emerged as a central theme, revealing a shift towards more individuals engaging in laptop-centric work, thereby posing challenges for access, education, and healthcare in Indonesia. This discourse illuminated the dual nature of digital transformation, presenting both opportunities—such as productivity growth, access to new markets, and improved work-life balance—and challenges, including

infrastructure, limitations, access issues, governance concerns, and the imperative need for social security.

The narrative then shifted to the specific context of Indonesia, particularly the eastern part grappling with digital inequality manifested through 4G coverage gaps and disparities in internet access based on factors like affordability, literacy, and application accessibility. The rise of the gig economy and gig workers was identified as a consequential outcome of digital transformation, accompanied by existing partnership mechanisms for digital work but hindered by suboptimal governance structures and regulatory challenges managed by various ministries.

The discussion further delved into the critical need for improving governance data for gig workers, citing challenges like the abundance but limited accessibility of data, undefined terms, the diverse nature of gig work, and irregular surveys on gig workers. Inclusivity took center stage as a crucial theme, underscoring internet access as a civil right, with Jakarta recognized as a cultural and economic hub presenting both opportunities and challenges.



Opportunities in Jakarta included well-equipped infrastructure, cultural richness due to significant events, and collaborative communities fostering innovative ideas. However, challenges, such as access to funding, the need for skilled individuals, and addressing issues of acknowledgement and plagiarism through improved societal education, were also acknowledged. Recommendations for overcoming these challenges focused on the transfer of knowledge, fostering collaboration, and clustering and championing to identify and support the most promising clusters within the creative and cultural sector.

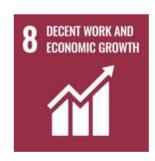
Participants identified several key challenges and opportunities pertinent to the creative economy in Jakarta. Access to funding and support for creative practitioners emerged as a pressing concern, alongside a talent shortage and the difficulty of securing skilled workers. The discussion delved into the undermining and lack of appreciation for the creative economy, acknowledging the need for broader recognition of its impact on the economy, society, culture, and the environment.

To address these challenges, recommendations were put forth, centering around knowledge transfer, collaboration, and enhanced connectivity. The importance of fostering collaboration and connectivity through events was underscored as a means to catalyze growth and innovation within the creative economy.

The session concluded by highlighting the challenge of unequal internet access in countries like Indonesia, advocating for a focus on guaranteeing social security for inclusive digital transformation. Emphasis was placed on the importance of social protection in a company's approach to employees, stressing the need to compete on different bases and increase productivity for sustained competitiveness.

In response to a question about the crucial mindset for gig workers, the emphasis was placed on continuous learning, particularly in utilizing Al, with additional stress on the significance of coordinating and consolidating collective belief in the societal impact of creative industries, underscoring the broader significance of individual work within the creative sector.

The study focuses on tech startups, namely agritech, cleantech, edtech, and healthtech.

Her current study is on labor market information (IPK). In this study, she and her team examine the readiness of employers and vocational high school graduates in making use of Karirhub-Sisnaker (Karirhub-Sistem Informasi Ketenagakerjaan), which is the national job platform provided by Indonesian Ministry of Labor ahead of the implementation of the Unemployment Benefit (JKP).

To increase research uptake, Mia ensures that engagements with important stakeholders are made during the research and the research outputs are also produced as policy briefs, research notes, and other publications for the policymakers. Her other efforts in policy engagement include being a resource person in seminars and focus group discussions (FGDs) related to the research topics, as well as in interviews with journalists.

In the dynamic context of Indonesia's flourishing digital creative industries, the conversation emphasised the critical role of youth while also highlighting the numerous obstacles these innovative initiatives must overcome. The largest of these difficulties is obtaining funding, as the vast majority of digital creative enterprises struggle with the harsh reality of having little access to loans or investments. These businesses' potential for expansion is stifled by this financial bottleneck, which has been identified as a major limitation. This is especially true for individual businesses, as it makes it more difficult for them to grow and scale.

The discussion underscored the vital role that youths play in the dynamic context of Indonesia's thriving digital creative industries, but it also highlighted the many challenges that these creative projects face. The biggest challenge among these is funding, as the great majority of digital creative businesses face the hard reality of having limited access to investments or loans. This financial bottleneck has been identified as a major barrier that stifles the possibility for expansion of these enterprises. This is particularly true for small enterprises, since it creates obstacles to their expansion and scalability.

As the conversation delved deeper into the world of artisanal creative economies, it focused on the gendered aspect of technology access. Women weavers encounter difficulties participating in the growing digital marketplace due to the digital divide they live in. Significant efforts, such those undertaken by TORAJAMELO, show the way forward by giving communities access to comprehensive support in addition to technology, enabling them to join the digital ecosystem. Further discussion touched on the majority's lack of concern about sustainability and the need for companies to prioritize social impact alongside financial metrics. Participants emphasized the role of governments in incentivizing companies aligned with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).



The discourse widened its lens to encompass the performing arts, unraveling the intricate challenges in financing endeavors within this sphere. Alternative models, notably leveraging technology and blockchain, emerged as beacons of potential, offering decentralized funding and direct community support. The call for performing artists to explore digital platforms and crowdfunding resonated as a transformative avenue for establishing a direct connection with their audiences.

The panelists addressed the significance of creative independence, emphasizing the need to carefully choose financial partners, considering their agendas and ensuring transparency in financial dealings. The discussion further explored the stages at which digital creators require financial support, with a focus on sustainable growth and creating more value. From an investor's perspective, the conversation highlighted the importance of major social impact, even as financial metrics remain a primary objective.

Questions were raised about convincing people in rural areas to embrace financial discussions and exploring weaknesses in the live performing arts industry in Indonesia and Malaysia. The speakers offered insights into building stages, exploring unconventional avenues, and adapting to the changing dynamics of the digital creative economy. Additionally, considerations for digital creators seeking external financing while maintaining creative independence were discussed, emphasizing the need to understand where investments come from.

Fostering Youth creativity, innovation, and entrepreneurship is not only essential for the region's economic growth but also for empowering its young population to become drivers of positive change, especially in the midst of increasing global issues, especially climate change. This session aims to explore strategies and opportunities for nurturing creativity, fostering sustainable innovation, and promoting entrepreneurship, all with a strong focus on involving Asia's youth while also pointing out the importance of IP.

The conversation emphasized the fundamental value of developing an innovation ecosystem that supports collaborations, research and development (R&D), and information sharing. Opensource innovation gained prominence, encouraging the group exchange of concepts and blueprints to accomplish common sustainability objectives. The substantial potential of combining innovation and sustainability was demonstrated by a number of noteworthy projects that concentrated on waste reduction, social effect, and alternative materials.

A recurring theme highlighted the power of storytelling in instilling appreciation and value for sustainable products. Beyond this, a comparative analysis unfolded, scrutinizing the growth trajectories of digital economy companies against traditional counterparts. The discussion elucidated the rapid growth potential of digital ventures, accentuating the imperative of maintaining sustainability as a key factor in their trajectory.

Naturally, the conversation grew to include the necessity of standardizing Asia's and Indonesia's innovation environment to ensure fair accessibility. It was emphasized how important it is to provide company ventures a clear purpose and impact, and how the government may function as a catalyst for entrepreneurial platforms. The connection between sustainability and growth was examined, with a focus on societal well-being rather than individual financial gain.

Prominent entities surfaced as exemplars within this landscape. CAST Foundation, at the intersection of arts, culture, science, and technology, wielded innovation to address emergent future problems and advocate for sustainability. Meanwhile, the Habibi Innovation Incubator took strides to augment collaboration through open innovation, placing significant emphasis on forging impactful partnerships.

Ensuring that access to skills, opportunities, and mobility within this dynamic sector is equitable for all is a fundamental challenge. This theme aims to explore strategies, policies, and initiatives that promote equal access and mobility, with a specific focus on fostering inclusivity within Asia's digital creative economy by bridging disparities and ensuring that the benefits of the digital creative economy are accessible to all segments of society, particularly the region's youth.

The session began by pinpointing significant challenges faced by the industry, including market segregation, a perplexing political landscape in Indonesia, toxic nationalism hindering cross-border collaboration, and the prevalence of shortterm thinking and template-based approaches. Uneven skill distribution across Southeast Asian countries added another layer to the hurdles. Amid these challenges, a multitude of opportunities emerged. The ascent of Asian narratives globally, a thriving social media and digital ecosystem, active government policies supporting digital economy development, and the interconnectedness fostered by communities painted a promising picture.

Throughout the discussion, the importance of industry collaboration and networking was emphasized. Stakeholders highlighted the necessity of real connections and partnerships, as well as preserving authenticity while adjusting to changing trends. The lack of a level playing field, particularly in terms of financial literacy and

ecosystem support, created problems for the creative industry's growth and development. It further expanded to include the broader aims and goals for the future of the digital and creative industries. A consensus emerged that growth, both locally and globally, is a common goal. The discussion then went to the critical question of who should drive this growth, with participants identifying a shared duty among policymakers, universities, investors, and the creators themselves.

Collaboration, knowledge sharing, and government support through training and funding were highlighted as key actions to drive the desired growth. The government emerged as a pivotal actor in facilitating progress, with participants expressing a positive mindset and a willingness to contribute their knowledge and skills.

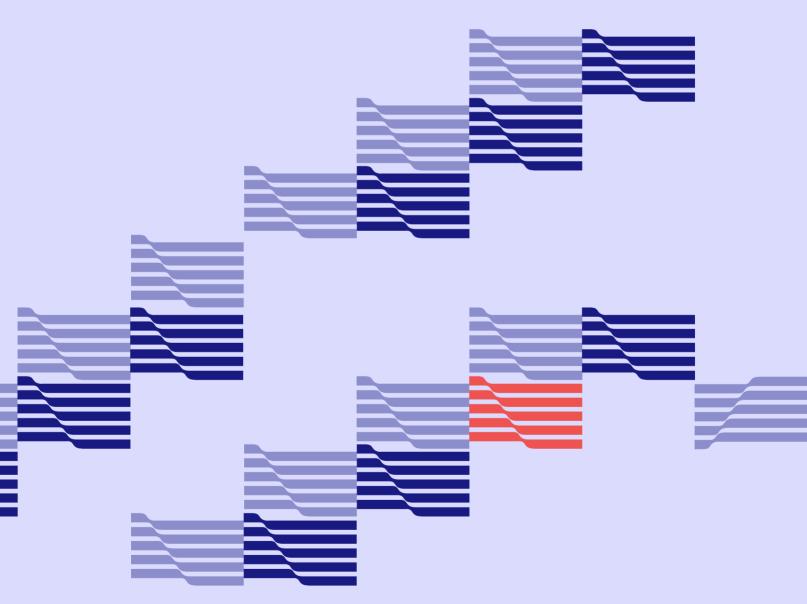

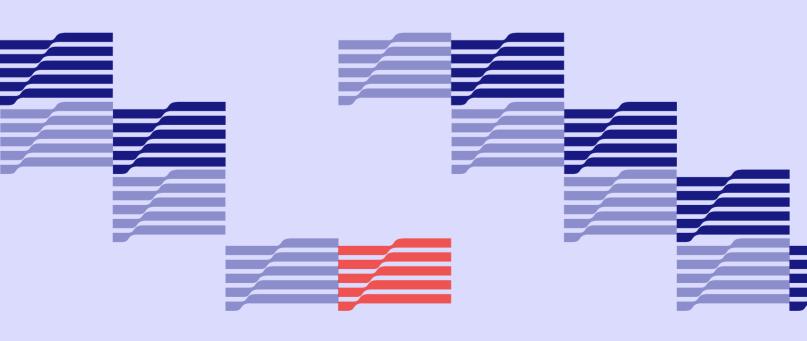

COLLECTIVE VISION JOINT DECLARATION OF THE FIRST ASIAN CREATIVE AND DIGITAL ECONOMY YOUTH SUMMIT

29 October 2023

We, the Creative Catalysts delegates (listed in Annex I), convened in Jakarta from 28 to 29 October 2023 for the first Asian Creative and Digital Economy Youth Summit (ACE-YS):

- 1. Acknowledge the Joint Statement of the Thirtieth ASEAN Socio-Cultural Community (ASCC) Council and Bali Creative Economy Roadmap 2022, which expresses the importance of youth participation for regional development, The First Asian Creative and Digital Economy Youth Summit aims to ignite youth's collective actions, contributing to sustainable creative and digital economy.
- 2. Commit to champion youth creativity, innovation as essential drivers of the creative and digital economy by creating an ecosystem that nurtures youth innovation by accentuating the themes of SDGs, digital transformation, and digital literacy as essential drivers of continuous growth.
- 3. Emphasize the importance of advocating for diversity, inclusivity, and social impact within the creative and digital industry, ensuring equitable access to funding, network opportunities, and knowledge and skills for all, fostering a more inclusive and vibrant creative ecosystem led by youth.

- 4. Actively share our expertise, experiences, and insights to empower fellow youth in the creative and digital sectors by creating a culture of learning, continuous improvement, and shared knowledge within and across countries, bridging and preserving local wisdom and cultural practices, and adapting to digital transformation.
- 5. Understand that access to funding, investment opportunities, and grants are critical and we will engage in collaborative discussions that explore and promote access to various financial resources available in different regions.
- 6. Recognize the potential of emerging talent to shape the future of the digital and creative economy. We pledge to provide mentorship, resources, and opportunities to empower and uplift the next generation of creative professionals.



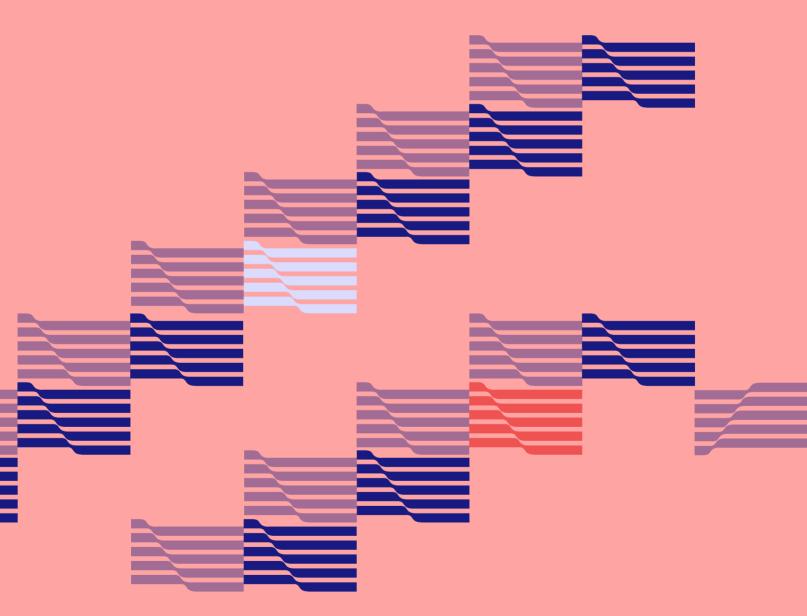

- **12. Agree** in the organization of ACE-YS regular annual summit on the weekend closest to 28th October in Jakarta.

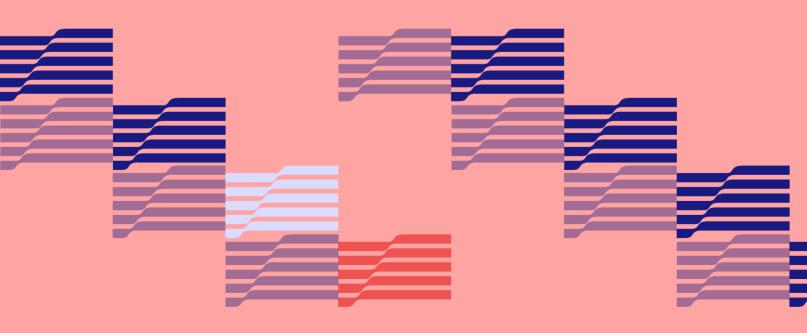

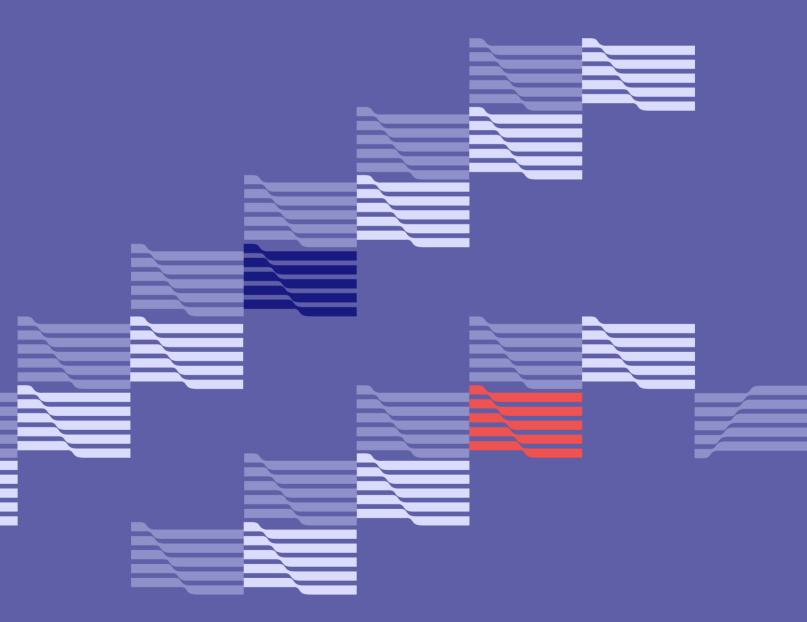
Mayasti Dwidya Nastiti
